WEIGHING ANCHOR/BREAKING FREE

As normal these are the thoughts of one person. Things can change rapidly out there. Everyone must react to what is happening in real time.

Weighing Anchor: Weighing anchor is relatively simple with the mud bottoms normally encountered on the Occoquan and Potomac. Assuming, of course that there is nothing under the surface in that particular spot at that particular time.

- 1. It is best to avoid problems. Therefore before dropping the anchor, take notice of whether or not there are any signs warning of underwater obstacles such as cables or any "Do not anchor here." signs. If other vessels are not anchored at a targeted location, why not? Check a chart beforehand, especially if anchoring solo in a new location.
- 2. It is a good idea to start the engine before weighing anchor. Drifting with a dead engine is something to avoid.
- 3. Using either human muscle or mechanical power, follow the rode and slowly move the bow of the boat toward the anchor. It is recommended not to use a windless to pull the boat toward the anchor. Gather as much rode aboard as possible via human muscle before applying any mechanical power. Vessels with chain need to use their windless more than vessels with line.
- 4. Be careful to move slowly enough toward the anchor that there is no danger of getting anchor rode tangled in the prop and/or rudder.
- 5. The idea is apply a vertical load to the anchor to break it free. A taut rode which goes straight up and down from a vessel is a good indication that there is a vertical load factor being applied.



SAFETY (CONT.)

- 6. Assuming a lack of chain, it may be possible to take a turn or two around a cleat and slowly move the boat forward. The anchor should break free. Apply a bit more throttle If it doesn't. Go back to neutral and bring the anchor and remaining rode onboard.
- 7. Dunk the anchor once or twice to get as much mud off as possible before storage. This should be done with the boat either in neutral or moving slowly in reverse. Anchors and gelcoat/fiberglass do not mix. Be alert to any vessel behind or whether or not the water is becoming dangerously shallow.

The Anchor Will Not Break Free: Here are some things to try. Most are stay-out-of-thewater options. Read the source at the end for some other thoughts.

- 1. Try to use the buoyancy of the vessel and the action of the water. Position the anchor rode as vertical as possible. With each up and down motion of the boat either wrap a bit more of the rode around a bow cleat or incrementally shorten the chain. Perhaps the action of the bow will break the anchor free.
- 2. A second thing to try is to let out a scope of 2-to-1 and slowly motor forward in an effort to back the hook out.
- 3. A third option is to circle the anchor while keeping the rode tight. Keep alert not to tangle anything in the prop, rudder, or damage anything hanging from the keel.
- 4. A fourth option is to evaluate the risks, then jump into the water and dive down. Or, attach some sort of float to a line, cut it, head home, and come back later for a dive to salvage the anchor. An anchor with chain that won't break free is a problem. Good luck.

OCCOQUAN SAFETY FORUM RE-CAP

More attendees than ever from law enforcement and fire/rescue organizations. Also 3 yacht clubs, 2 boat rental clubs, 3 paddling organizations, ORMA, BoatUS, and PWM & Belmont Bay Marinas, but no Vulcan.

After introductions, all were asked to address their single most important river safety issue in 2 minutes apiece. A side product was coordination between first responders for combined training exercises.

Other tidbits that apply to all:

- 1. Expect increased enforcement on "Operating under the Influence" OUI & night patrols on the water.
- 2. In an emergency, always call 9-1-1 first & then make your radio call. This is a change in paradigm brought on by reliability of the cell phone networks. Why first? To get the first responders moving. Some need to launch boats to get to you. Of course the corollary to this is you must know your location, and the best way for this is the phone app "what 3 words". All first responders use this nowadays...

(Lifeline editor note: PWYC will share more about the 'What 3 Words' app on Opening Day.)

- 3. Occoquan Paddlefest is the morning of May 18 (same day as Blessing of the Fleet from noon to 2pm). Need same cautions to all PWYC Captains.
- 4. ORMA got traction on a media campaign for "Wake Awareness Week" the first week in June.


1. Tie a Boat Fender using a Clove Hitch



"Prop Talk" article featuring PWYC's Dave & Sonia Astle's Great Loop adventure

Chesapeake Bay Boaters Complete America's Great Loop

Monday, January 29, 2024

Chesapeake Bay boaters Dave and Sonia Astle recently completed America's Great Loop in their

Ranger Tug.

THE BOAT:

Crew Lounge, so named because Dave is retired from American Airlines, and also because he's noticed a tendency for some guests and crew to lounge while boating. Crew Lounge, a Ranger Tug R43 CB, is their sixth boat and follows a Ranger 31, which they enjoyed greatly. However, they thought a little more room would be ideal for completing the Loop, so they made the purchase in the fall of 2020 with America's Great Loop specifically in mind.

ROUTE AND ITINERARY:

In early June 2022 Dave and Sonia departed their home slip on Dymer Creek in Whitestone, VA, on Virginia's Northern Neck for an expedition expected to take one year. They would travel counterclockwise around America's Great Loop, a mega adventure that began humbly enough—motoring north on the Bay and transiting the C&D Canal to Cape May, NJ. There, they slipped "outside" to the Atlantic Ocean before making their way inland to the Hudson River, the St. Lawrence Seaway, Lakes Erie and Ontario, and the Thousand Islands, which straddle the US-Canada border. The passage through the Trent-Severn Waterway, constructed between 1833 and 1920, brought the couple to the beautiful Georgian Bay and Lake Huron, the North Channel, and eventually back into the States.

Navigating Lake Michigan, they chose, for a couple of reasons, to head south along the western shore of the lake, hugging Wisconsin. Storms often build as they cross the lake west to east, but equally importantly, they wanted to stop in Green Bay, WI, and visit some of Sonia's extended family. Dave and Sonia made their way through downtown Chicago and entered the river system, which carried them to the Gulf of Mexico and Florida. Instead of continuing to the Keys on the west coast, they crossed to the east coast through Lake Okeechobee and then down the ICW to the Keys for almost a month. Heading toward home, they took a side trip to the Bahamas from West Palm Beach. They returned home to the Bay in early June 2023, having earned their Golden Looper status for completing the entire Loop.

DID THEY SELL THEIR HOME AND BELONGINGS?:

While some Loopers choose to sell or rent their homes, Sonia and Dave did not. In fact, every two months they returned home for a two-week stint. Sonia explains, "We had family at home that we wanted to spend time with and who sometimes needed our help. This way, we didn't miss special milestones, such as birthdays. The visits helped me feel more grounded and connected to our 'regular' life."

ASTLES' GREAT LOOP ADVENTURE (cont).

BEST PART OF THE TRIP?

Dave: The whole thing! But if I had to narrow it down, I'd say Georgian Bay.

Sonia: Completing the Loop was the adventure of a lifetime, and the whole thing was beyond words. A few things that stand out in my mind are the wonderful people we met, the friendships we formed, waking up every day to a new adventure, the little towns in Canada that were all unique, and the natural elements: the flowers, the wildlife, the clear beautiful water.

BUDDY BOATING:

Dave: You can be with another boat for several days, and then one of you might take a side trip and you split up, but you notice that you keep bumping into the same boats. You form relationships with the other boaters doing the Loop. The America's Great Loop Cruisers Association (AGLCA) boaters are the politest boaters you will come across. They really look out for one another. We found other Loopers by looking for the AGLCA burgee and using the Nebo app, which tracks movements of other boats. We jokingly referred to it as the Great Loop stalking app!

Sonia: One of the best parts of the adventure is meeting all the people. Buddy boats help you feel safe. They understand the kinds of problems you run into and know how to help. Afterward you either keep in contact or have fond memories of them. For us, in September, just three months after completing the Loop, we traveled to England with six other people from three boats that we had met on the Loop and chartered Narrow Boats on the English canals. We also had several AGLCA boats cruising the Bay last season stop at our home dock.

THEY'RE NOT DONE YET!

In December, Dave and Sonia took Crew Lounge to the Exumas, a part of the Bahamas that they didn't get to during their loop. What is next? They're not sure, but they agree that they would enjoy returning to the Georgian Bay and perhaps Lake Champlain and the Rideau Canal in Canada.

On the bow the day we completed the Loop with our not-yet-complete white burgee and the gold burgee, which indicates we have completed the Loop.

ADVICE FOR THOSE CONSIDERING THE LOOP:

- If you have a feeling you might like it, just go do it! You won't regret it. It's spectacular-beyond words.
- AGLCA seminars are a nice way to learn what to expect. It may take several years of planning.
- When barge captains hail you with directions, listen. They'll tell you what they want you to do.
- Respect the weather and do your homework. Be ready to change your plans on a dime.
- Harbor Hosts will make themselves known. They are an amazing resource: don't be afraid to call.
- Consider if you'd like to anchor more or slip your boat at a marina. We stayed mostly in marinas because we wanted to get off the boat to exercise and walk. It was a good way to meet locals and shop locally, and it was a great way to meet other Loopers. Every evening we would all find one another and gather around 5 p.m.
- Consider how you will eat. We ate healthy, sit-down dinners. Provisioning was not difficult. Most of the time we were really only three days from a Walmart.
- You don't have to be retired. We met couples with one or both working online from their boat.
- Get creative with using your space. A freezer can double as a coffee table for more storage.
- AIS is really important. We were often with no cell service. Pay the nominal fee to be capable of both transmitting and receiving.




Port of Baltimore Safety Zone - Francis Scott Key Bridge Marine Casualty

Effective immediately a safety zone is established for all navigable waters of the Chesapeake Bay within a 2000-yard radius of the Francis Scott Key Bridge. The 948-foot Singapore-flagged vessel DALI struck the Francis Scott Key Bridge on March 26, 2024.

The safety zone is intended to protect personnel, vessels, and the marine environment in these navigable waters. No vessel or person will be permitted to enter the safety zone without obtaining permission from the COTP or a designated representative. The COTP is currently issuing a Broadcast Notice to Mariners (BNM) via VHF-FM marine channel 16. Mariners are requested to monitor the VHF channel 16 for the latest

information.

You may not enter the safety zone described above unless authorized by the COTP or the COTP's designated representative. To seek permission to enter, contact the COTP the COTP's representative by telephone at (410) 576-2525 or on Marine Band Radio VHF-FM channel 16 (156.8 MHz). Those in the safety zone must comply with all lawful orders or directions given to them by the COTP or the COTP's designated representative. The U.S. Coast Guard may be assisted in the patrol and enforcement of the safety zone by Federal, State, and local agencies.

A proposed regulation that would decimate recreational boating and devastate coastal economies along the East Coast is making its way through the federal rulemaking process, and we need your help to stop it. The rule could become law at any moment – we must act NOW.

Tell Congress to Urge the Administration to Withdraw the Harmful Vessel Speed Restriction Rule

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) has proposed expanding its North Atlantic Right Whale Vessel Strike Reduction Rule to limit the speed of recreational boats 35 ft. and greater to 10 knots (11 mph) in areas up to 90 miles offshore for a good portion of the year. This would severely limit access to the Atlantic Ocean in the fall, winter and spring, putting lives at risk, as small boats cannot safely travel at these slow speeds in the open ocean. The rule was developed without any input from the recreational boating industry, which supports 812,000 jobs and 36,000 small businesses. The rule ignores existing and emerging technologies that could be deployed to reduce vessel strike risk and save marine mammals.

Make your voice heard – tell your members of Congress to write the Biden administration and urge them to withdraw this harmful rule. Instead of a blanket speed restriction, NOAA must engage with the industry to develop and implement balanced, technology-focused solutions to protect both marine life and the boating economy.
